## Deadline to receive images is November 1

- Send only photos that show the bloom at its best, i.e. the bloom faces the camera in the same way it would be viewed by a judge at a show.
- Photos may be taken indoors or out, but the lighting must reflect the true color of the bloom as much as possible. Please avoid taking photos in direct sunlight or under fluorescent lights.
- Do not crop or alter photos before submitting.
- The ADS reserves the right to reject photos that do not adequately represent a show-quality bloom.

### Some Tips:

1. Here are some examples of photos that show the bloom at its best. Note that the bloom itself is within the boundaries of the photo, but the camera was moved in close so that the bloom is the main focus of the shot.



When taking photos outdoors, bring the camera around to the front of the bloom so that its face is clearly seen.



2. Make sure to rename your photo files so that they indicate the variety to avoid confusion. The preferred format is:

classification number\_variety name\_year photo was taken.file format For example:

3308\_parklandrave\_2020.jpg
