- Dahlia Common Mosaic Virus-DCMV
- Cucumber Mosaic Virus-CMV
- Tomato Spotted Wilt Virus-TSWV
- Impatiens Necrotic Spot Virus- INSV
- Tobacco Streak Virus- TSV



## **NO CURE**

- Once infected with virus, there is no cure.
- Virus symptoms range from none to severe disease.
- Different viruses have different symptoms and vary by cultivar.
- Virus symptoms vary by season.







#### SYMPTOMS

- Chlorosis- Reduction or loss of normal green color of leaves usually along the leaf veins.
- Mosaic pattern- light green or yellow pattern gives a mottled appearance.
- Ringspot- light green or yellow concentric rings.
- Stunted growth of new foliage/plant.
- Leaf malformation.

### WHAT CAN I DO?

# THINK CLEAN - START CLEAN STAY CLEAN & BE CLEAN

#### **Sources of Infection:**

Infected - tubers, cuttings, and plants

#### **Spread by:**

- Insects thrips, aphids, leaf hoppers and other bugs
- Human Intervention tools that cutsnips, pruners, scissors, loppers, shovels



#### **BEST PRACTICES**

If it looks sick, it "probably" is sick.

Dig it up and throw it out.

(not in compost)

#### When in doubt throw it out!

- Don't trade, sell, or save potentially infected tubers.
- The biggest impact a gardener can have is to clean tools between plants.

#### Sanitize your tools:

1 cup of bleach in 1 gallon of water.

One dip in the bleach solution and one cutting of the plant then trade snips.



## **TESTING PLANTS FOR A VIRUS**

Has developed a rapid at home test for DMV and DCMV.

Have a dahlia panel that tests for 22 viruses



# WHAT IS THE AMERICAN DAHLIA SOCIETY "CLEAN STOCK INITIATIVE"?

The **Clean Stock Initiative** is an ADS program that offers reduced testing costs for virus to ADS Clubs/Societies and commercial growers.

Subsidized by the Scheetz-Chuey Foundation.
The testing is done at Washington State
University under the direction of Dr. Hanu Pappu.

The goal is to increase knowledge of dahlia viruses and to reduce the amount of virus stock in circulation.

Testing is voluntary and results are confidential.



## **CLEAN GARDEN**

- CMV and DMV are spread by aphids.
- INSV, TSV, and TSWV are spread by thrips.

Get rid of environments that are friendly to thrips and aphids.



# SUGGESTED PEST MANAGEMENT ALTERNATIVES

Blue and yellow sticky cards above the plant canopy attracts thrips.

Insect Spray – Spinosad (aphids & thrips). OMRI Certified.

Predatory mites that feed on thrips. ex. amblseius cucumeris.

Spray with commercially available Neem Oil or Insecticidal Soap. (Aphids)

Release Lady Bugs for aphid control.

Pirate bug, Orius. A predator for thrips.

Plant an ornamental pepper "Purple Flash" with dahlias.

(Provides a habitat for the insect predator pirate bug)

Beneficial nematodes are naturally occurring microscopic organisms in the soil that inject bacteria that kills the host pest.



Always read labels and follow instructions



#### A FEW TAKE AWAYS



A combination of clean stock and careful disinfecting of garden tools greatly decreases the presence of virus infected dahlias in your garden.

Clean gardens are created over several growing seasons but it is never too late to start now.

If you are a member of a Dahlia Society that has display gardens, ask their Board of Directors about testing plants for dahlia viruses.

Do they spread through the seed?


